# *Shrewsbury Police Department*

## *In Remembrance*



The Shrewsbury Police Department is mourning the sudden and unexpected passing of Sgt. Allan Morris who died on April 22, 2011 after becoming ill at his home. Allan was scheduled to retire, after serving the residents of Shrewsbury for 25 years. Allan joined the Shrewsbury Police Department in 1986 and, throughout his tenure, served as the Department Photographer, Traffic Safety Officer, Crime Prevention Officer and Investigator. In 1997, Allan was promoted to Sergeant where he served as the Supervisor of the Traffic Safety Unit. Known for his stoic demeanor and unflappable professionalism while at work, those who knew Allan outside of his life as a police officer remember someone different; He was an avid saltwater fisherman who explained every slow fishing day by exclaiming “guess we should’ve been here yesterday.” He was an ice hockey player whose physical style of play earned him the nickname “Albow” among his fellow players. He was a motorcycle enthusiast who was a member and past president of the Blue Knights NJ III Motorcycle

Club. Most recently, he was a tireless worker who spent countless hours raising money for various charities including Special Olympics, Lunch Break and the New Hope Foundation. An avid fan of Jimmy Buffet, Allan, his wife Penny and daughter Gabriella helped to plan and run numerous fundraisers for Buffet’s International Parrot Head Clubs. Nobody who knew Allan can say that they don’t remember him “convincing” them to buy another arm’s length of 50/50 tickets at a fundraiser or dinner. On April 22, the residents of Shrewsbury lost a quality police officer whose attention to detail and dedication to his job benefitted them for almost 25 years. But at a time like this, we must remember that he was more than that; he was a Husband, a Father, a trusted colleague and most importantly a friend.

## *Shrewsbury Department of Public Works*

The Borough is experiencing a greater than typical volume of **unacceptable items** left at the Recycling Center at 90 White Road. These items expose the Borough to costly regulatory infractions. Additionally, the safe removal of these items are costing you, the taxpayer.

**Acceptable** recycled items: plastic, glass, newspaper, corrugated cardboard, junk mail.

**Unacceptable** items left at the recycling center: computer and electronics (tv’s, radios, cameras, telephones, vcrs, dvds, stereos; paint cans (full or empty); car batteries; bulk trash; brush; construction materials; any type of hazardous material.

As stated in the Borough Directory, residents should properly dispose of paint cans, propane tanks, and all other household chemicals by calling the **Hazardous Waste Disposal Facility** on Shafto Rd. at (732) 922-2234 to make an appointment for drop off.

In January 2009, the **NJ Electronic Waste Recycling Act** was adopted. This act **prohibits residents from putting computers, tv’s, cell phones, and other electronic devices** that have toxic metals or dangerous chemicals **out in the trash**. The Borough’s Environmental Commission has it’s own electronic recycling day held in April of each year. If you missed this, Monmouth County ([www.co.monmouth.nj.us](http://www.co.monmouth.nj.us)) has many sites to help you with disposal of these items. Here are the four closest:

Residents can arrange for curbside pick up of large metal appliances such as refrigerators, washers, dryers (with doors removed) by calling Public Works at (732) 741-0522. ### *Clerk's Office*

The summer season is upon us. Please remember to come to our offices to obtain the following:

**Garage Sale Permits:** Permits are \$5.00 and only take minutes to complete. **Please remember that signs are not permitted on Borough property (between curb and sidewalk) nor on any tree or telephone pole.** If you need to market your sale on a corner lot please be respectful and ask the homeowner if you may place a sign on their property.

**Tennis Badges:** Use of the Borough courts has always required a badge. Due to the costs associated with the court improvements and the continued costs for carrying the warranty, the badge costs (user fees) have increased to the following: Residents: \$3/day, \$20/year, \$50/ family max.; Non-residents: \$5/day, \$35/year. A cost adjustment for senior citizens is pending. A combination lock became necessary to maintain the condition of the courts. The combination is given when the badge is purchased. Court times may be reserved by calling the above phone number.

**Landlord Registration Certificates:** In light of the volume of rented residential properties this year, our offices need to remind all landlords of State Law NJSA 46:8-26 requiring the completion of a Landlord Registration Certificate with our office. This requirement applies to all rental premises or units used for dwelling purposes except owner-occupied premises with no more than two rental units (i.e. carriage house, mother-daughter). The only cost involved in obtaining the Certificate relates to the Fire Marshall's inspection of the property. Please note for your own protection, the court shall not recognize any legal action between the landlord and tenant until there is a Certificate on file.

**Door-to-Door/Store Front Solicitations:** Approval by the Clerk's office is required of anyone soliciting or canvassing in the Borough of Shrewsbury. Residents are encouraged to ask solicitors for proof of Borough approval; a badge or a certification letter signed by our Clerk, Kathy Krueger. Please note that by state law, the Borough is not permitted to deny a solicitation request of a non-profit organization as long as our requests for proof of exempt status, financial information and list of volunteers is provided. 'For - profit' organizations/ individuals must meet several requirements under our Borough Codes, Chapter 132, the first of which is to have a Borough Business License.

### **Shrewsbury Garden Club Hosts “Make a Rain Barrel” Workshop *New Barrels Expected to Save 26,000 Gallons of Municipal Water***

Straddling 55-gallon plastic pickle barrels and wielding battery-powered drills, more than a dozen local residents learned first hand how easy (and fun!) it is to catch and harvest rainwater during the Shrewsbury Garden Club’s (SGC) first ever “Make a Rain Barrel” workshop, Saturday, May 21 at the Shrewsbury Hose Company, No. 1.

Organized by SGC members Robin Blair and Kathy Davison, the two-hour Rutgers University-based presentation and workshop was designed to give participants everything they needed to build, operate and maintain a customized rain barrel. The workshop was part of the club’s newest initiative to increase the number of rain barrels in use in Shrewsbury and the surrounding towns as a way to conserve water, save money and preserve the environment. By diverting water from storm drains, rain barrels decrease the impact of pollution and storm water runoff into streams and riverbeds. In addition, reusing rainwater helps decrease the energy taken to treat tap water. And since rainwater does not contain chlorine, lime or calcium, plants usually prefer it to treated water. ## ***2011 Preservation Award***

Jason & Leslie Eaton, 916 Broad Street, are this year's recipients of one of three Monmouth County Historical Commission's 2011 Preservation Awards. This award was given "to the owners of property who have engaged in successful preservation projects on their own." Local resident, Eleanor Judd, submitted the nomination. The Eatons were recognized for work on their Broad Street residence that has a prominent presence in the Shrewsbury historic district. They completed the home's historically accurate restoration project by being true to the period color and working systems. In presenting the award to the Eatons during a ceremony in Freehold, June 13; Freeholder Lillian G. Burry commented, "We speak regularly of Monmouth County as a historic county. Monmouth is historic not only for what happened here, but for the efforts of those who preserve the environment that preceded them through their good efforts and will be there for future generations." She further commented, "preserving these sentinels of the past takes more than interest in history; it takes personal dedication, hard work and financial commitment by these current guardians of our shared heritage." This treasured Victorian home was constructed in 1892 by George W. Barlow; foreman of Shrewsbury's famed Hazard Ketchup Factory. The Eatons' home was the site of the 2008 Shrewsbury Historical Society Autumn party and was featured in the Fall issue of "The Jersey Shore" magazine in an article written by Christine Menapace entitled, "Opposites Attract: A Young Couple Restores an Old Shrewsbury Victorian."

### ***Shrewsbury Community Alliance for the Prevention of Alcohol and Drug Abuse***

Parents play a major role in their children's choices about alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. There was a recent article in the USA Weekend section of the Asbury Park Press (June 3, 2011) titled "Talk To Your Kids About Drinking." This article highlights points from a new program by MADD called Power of Parents. Following are some tips and strategies to help ensure our children remain healthy and drug free: \*Establish rules with clear consequences. Kids look to parents for guidance, goals and expectations. Teens say their parents' disapproval is the top reason they don't try drugs and alcohol. \*Communicate with parents of your child's friends. Make sure they are going to be home and they are supervising....especially during sleep-overs. Call to see if your child can bring something as a way to start the conversation. \*Ask questions and know their friends. \*Lock up your prescription drugs, OTC cold medicines and alcohol. \*When you are hosting a gathering with teens protect yourself and the teens by observing what is coming into your home. Ask that large backpacks/purses be left in a common area. \*Be a good role model. In the latest survey, kids who say they have seen their parents drunk are more likely to experiment. Being a parent of a teen in this environment is tough. We suffer from peer pressure from other more liberal parents to turn a blind eye. Stand up to what you believe is right for your child. There are other parents who do believe as you do. Starting to drink and experiment with drugs at the age of 14 is not a good omen for their health in later years. Please remember that what you do matters, what you say matters, what you expect matters to your children.

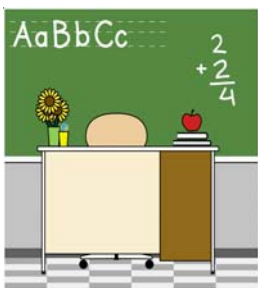
Current Projects - Update of our Resource Guide to Drug, Alcohol Abuse and other Health Services in Monmouth County. This guide has been invaluable to many of our residents. Check our Boro webpage for updates. A number we wish to highlight for our residents is the 24/7 Mobile Response number (1-877-652-7624). Funded by the State, this is a 24 hr service providing emergency response care for children and adolescents through 18 yrs of age who are experiencing emotional or behavioral crisis'. (Please continue to dial 9-1-1 for medical emergencies)... We had a booth at the Earth Day Fair on April 30 where we provided literature on various topics ranging from drug and alcohol abuse to bullying. We are also working on Red Ribbon Week 2011 at Shrewsbury Boro School. It will be held October 17-21 and this year's theme is "Stay On Track For Success... Drug Free"... the 5th Graders graduated from the DARE program on Friday, June 3... Friday, June 10th was Field Day at SBS, where Officer Boyd & Sgt. Fitzgerald held an Alcohol Awareness Day for the 8th grade students. The students saw a presentation on the dangers of drinking and driving, and then were asked to perform certain tasks, such as catching a ball, completing a puzzle, and driving a golf cart through a cone course, while wearing vision impairment goggles.
